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## Ancient Greek

### Pronunciation

- (*5th BC Attic*): IPA: /átlaas/
- (*1st BC Egyptian*): IPA: /átla:s/
- (*4th AD Koine*): IPA: /átlas/
- (*10th AD Byzantine*): IPA: /átlas/
- (*15th AD Constantinopolitan*): IPA: /átlas/

### Etymology

The old interpretation is from ἀ- (*a-*, “copulative prefix”) + the Proto-Indo-European root *\*telh<sub>2</sub>-* of τλήναι (*tlênai*, “to thole, suffer, endure, bear”). But according to Beekes, a Pre-Greek word.
