

Demiourgos - See Demiurge.

Demiurge - The great archon (ruler) in Gnosticism. To Valentinus he is "an angel like God," equated with the God of the Jews. He has always been connected with Mithras. And, in *The Study of the Kabalah*, Demiourgos is the Greek's name for Metatron. One of Demiurge's titles is "Architect of the Universe," which suggests that it was he, and not God, who created the world, at the moment of Ain Soph, the Unknowable.

Etymology

From δῆμιος (*dēmios*, “public”) + ἔργον (*érgon*, “labor, work”)

Pronunciation

- (5th BC Attic): IPA: /d̥ɛ̯mi.o̯ɾɡós/
- (1st BC Egyptian): IPA: /deːmiuːɾɡós/
- (4th AD Koine): IPA: /ðimiurɣós/
- (10th AD Byzantine): IPA: /ðimiurɣós/
- (15th AD Constantinopolitan): IPA: /ðimiurɣós/

Noun

δημιουργός • (dēmioourgós) (*genitive δημιουργοῦ*) *m*, *second declension*

- one who works for the people, a skilled workman, handicraftsman
 - the maker of the world
- (*in some Peloponesian states*) magistrate

From Ancient Greek δημιουργός (*dēmiourgós*, “worker for the common good”), from δήμιος (*dēmios*) + ἔργον (*érgon*).

- creator of original works, craftsman, artisan
- Demiurge
