

Čamā'a (Jamā'a)

The Arabic noun, <code>jamā'a</code> (plural, <code>jamā'at</code>), a group, is related to the verb <code>jama'</code>, to gather. In Taṣawwuf ("Ṣūfism"), a <code>jamā'a</code> is a group of Ṣūfiyah ("Ṣūfīs") operating under the authority of a particular <code>shaykh</code>, pīr, murshīd, sarkār, <code>kh</code>alīfah, etc.

However, *Ṭarīqah ASMA™*, as a *post-Ṣūfī* ṭarīqah, functions outside the *sharī'a* (the prescription) of Islām. Since, in the Bahá'í Faith, there is no hierocracy (or clerical polity), the concept of *ǧamā'a* has been recontextualized into an egalitarian social framework. No one can authoritatively interpret scripture for anyone else.
